Local Health Services in Tinsley Have Your Say

he South East Sheffield Primary Care Trust is planning changes to local health services in Tinslev. Over a number of years local residents and Tinsley Forum have raised concerns about the quality of their local health services. The PCT have commissioned a research team from Sheffield Hallam University to undertake an independent study to understand these concerns better and to see how they might be addressed in future service provision.

You might be one of the 450 patients from Highgate and Ingfield Avenue surgeries who have been chosen at random to complete a questionnaire. Your views matter, please make every effort to complete the questionnaire when the interviewer calls on you in the next couple of weeks.

If you have not received a letter about the questionnaire then you could have your say at the drop in listening session on Saturday 20th September from 10 am to 1.00 pm at Tinsley Methodist Church. Or you could take part in one of five small discussion groups that are taking place over the next couple of weeks (to book a place see back page). Remember its your health



Tinsley Rec. Regeneration

he extensive Community Consultation that took place in April/May of this year, and highlighted in the April edition of the Tribune is now starting to pay dividends

The masterplan and associated drawings for the regeneration of the rec. have now been completed by by the Architects Landscape Projects and preliminary phasing and costing of how the work can be undertaken have been produced.

The drawings for the new Family Centre have now been revised and completed by SELF Arcitects and costing for the new complex completed. Both sets of plans now fully reflect the

majority views of Tinsley residents, obtained in April/May.

Residents have been calling into the SureStart offices to enquire when work will be commencing in the recreation ground, we are still a bit away from that position at the moment

Planning approval will now need to be sought for the schemes and that could take upwards of 6 months, then design and contractor appointment still needs to be made so it will be well into next year before work can commence

Now that approximate costs have been determined the whole aspect of additional funding required needs to be determined and this in itself will take a fair amount of time

Study on local primary health care services in Tinsley

INFORMATION SHEET

Introduction

A study into Tinsley residents' views and experiences of local health care services is being carried out. This sheet explains why the study is being done and what it will involve. If anything is unclear, or you would like more information, please contact Sue Greig or Baljit Sanghera at the PCT on 0114 226 4050.

Why is the study taking place?

The South East Sheffield Primary Care Trust (PCT) is planning changes to local health services in Tinsley. Over a number of years local residents and Tinsley Forum have raised concerns about the quality of their local health services. In order to understand these concerns better and see how they might be addressed in future service provision the PCT have commissioned Sheffield Hallam University to undertake independent research. As a Tinsley resident you have the opportunity to take part in the study.

There are three parts to the study:

• Questionnaire survey
A total of 450 patients from Highgate

and Ingfield Avenue surgeries have been chosen at random to complete a questionnaire. In early September all those randomly picked will receive a letter informing them about the study. During September community researchers will visit them at home and help them complete the questionnaire. The questionnaire will be available in English and Urdu and the community researchers will be able to offer interpreting help if needed.

Focus group research

Five focus group discussions will take place in September for the different sections of the Tinsley community - Pakistani women (aged18-30 & 30+); Pakistani men; white men; and white women. There will be 8-10 people in each group and each discussion will last approximately 2 hours. The dates and times of the focus group discussions will be publicised locally and places will be allocated on a first come first served basis. (see back page)

PCT 'Drop-In' sessions

At the end of July the PCT held two open drop-in sessions to listen to local residents' views on health services in Tinsley. One further drop in session will be organised on a Saturday to be arranged in September; the date will be publicised locally. (see back page)

How will the findings from this study be reported and used?

At the end of October the Sheffield Hallam University research team will draw together evidence from the questionnaire survey and focus group research and report their findings. A report on the drop-ins will be produced by the Sheffield NHS Infomatics Service in October. Both reports will be presented to Tinsley residents, through Tinsley Forum and Darnall Area Panel, and to the local primary health care teams. Using all this evidence the PCT will then discuss and agree plans for future health services in Tinsley with Tinsley Forum, the Darnall Area Panel and the local primary health care workers.

Do I have to take part?

No, taking part is voluntary. If you do not want to take part you do not have to give a reason. If you take part but later change your mind you can withdraw at any time from the study.
