Tinsley Towpath improvements welcomed by Local Residents

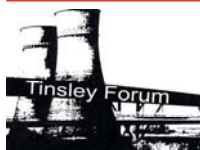


Talking to local people using the tow path they are pleased with the improvements. Last autumn Tinsley Forum was successful in getting funding from Big Lottery Community Spaces for improvements to the canal towpath from Wharf Road Canal bridge to the bridge over to the tram stop and Meadowhall. We called the project Tinsley Canalside Access Project. Well we have now finished all the work which included cutting back vegetation, new lighting under viaduct, painting of railings under viaduct and on canal bridge, two benches, two interpretation boards one about the history of the area and the other the flora and fauna of the area, new signage, a new litter bin, a wildflower meadow (Not looking great this year should improve next year). The towpath was resurfaced by Sheffield City Council. The project came about because of residents concerns about overhanging trees and vegetation and poor lighting making people feel unsafe to use the towpath to get to the tram stop or Meadowhall. If you have not been on the towpath recently then please give it a try. You could use it to start a walk or cycle ride exploring other parts of the canal towpath towards the City Centre or Rotherham and the Five Weirs walk on the bank of the River Don to the city centre. On Friday 23rd September at 1.30pm the project will be officially opened by Julie Dore Leader of Sheffield City Council Tinsley residents are very welcome to attend this event.

The first round of Small Grants was announced in June 2011. Local Councillors of the Assembly agreed to fund 14 projects in the Darnall Ward which covers Darnall, Tinsley and North Handsworth. Successful Groups in Tinsley this round were:

Women in Construction Arts & Technology £666 (free course in the area to learn construction skills)

Tinsley Over 60's Lunch Club £1000

Total for Tinsley in round 1 £1,666

Round 2 closed on Monday 5th September, there may be a third round open in October if funds are still available, otherwise it will restart in April 2012.

This is your chance to question your local councillors about local issues, and hear and question what the Assembly is spending its project money on before decisions are taken on the night in public.



Highways Improvements

The East Community Assembly has delegated to it a sum of money to spend in the area on agreed highways schemes.

Councillors of the East Assembly agreed to spend its allocated highways funding two ways. Firstly, large schemes that address child accident locations and secondly smaller schemes that the community ask for and have the greatest benefit for most people.

For the large scheme this financial year, the East Assembly has agreed to look at improving crossing the road at the top of East Bank Road at the Hurlfield Rd junction, the location of child accidents. Ideas for the location and type of crossing improvements will now be consulted on with the public and



local residents living nearby.

Smaller schemes the Assembly have funded recently in the Darnall Ward include: Dropped kerbs at Leeds Rd, Worksop Rd, Bootle St, Jubilee Rd to help wheelchairs, prams and visually impaired people cross road junctions more safely.

Bollards on Prince of Wales Rd, Wellington Place and Greenland Drive to stop illegal parking

New path on Greenland Way and new handrails on Maple Grove and Retford Road. A new community project for older people 65 yrs+ who want to get wiser about keeping warm and saving money.

Thanks to a 3 year grant from Comic Relief, South Yorkshire Energy Centre, can now offer a community based project to five lucky communities within Sheffield.

The Older, Wiser, Warmer Project will support older residents within Sheffield to become volunteer 'Energy Champions' within their local communities. The volunteers, once trained, will help other older people to take appropriate steps towards energy efficiency and affordable warmth in their own homes, for example the use of heating controls, getting the most from their energy supplier or accessing financial or other support available through local and national bodies.

Their involvement with the project will be for a couple of hours a week for approximately six months – We will be looking to recruit 10 volunteers every 6 months from within 5 different communities in Sheffield.

Seven Energy Champion volunteers have recently been trained in Uppertorpe/ Netherthorpe and are now getting active within their community. The volunteers are planning a community environmental day, and are in the early stages of setting up a new Community Charity Shop with Agewell Sheffield. The volunteers are ready to offer energy saving tips to their friends, family and their more isolated elderly neighbours. "The charity shop will be a great way for volunteers to make contact with local people; we want to pass on our wisdom of how to keep warm this winter," said Hazel.

The Older, Wiser, Warmer project be coming to Tinsley/Darnall next starting November 2011 It will be delivered in partnership with Local community organisations like Tinsley Forum, Community Health and Learning Champions. Shelly will be presenting the project at Tinsley Information Day 10 -1pm Tuesday 27th September at Tinsley Community Centre.

Get the Energy Buzz as Hydro Power comes to Tinsley!

There's exciting news as Sheffield's first community-owned water power scheme has got the go-ahead - Sheffield Renewables has been granted planning permission for an Archimedes screw to generate electricity at Jordan Dam, Blackburn Meadows. This is a modern use for a machine originally invented by the Ancient Greeks to pump water uphill. Jordan Dam Hydro is the result of lots of hard work by committed, enthusiastic volunteers. In 2008 plans for Jordan Dam began in the front rooms of a handful of people that wanted more renewable energy in Sheffield. This would reduce the city's contribution to climate change and boost local energy supplies. In the past, Sheffield's rivers provided power for the city's industries, so they set up Sheffield Renewables and started developing water power.



Volunteer Abigail says "Out of all Sheffield's weirs, Jordan Dam can produce the most power. Each year it could generate enough electricity for 80 typical homes, saving approximately 150 tonnes of carbon dioxide emissions."

To mark the arrival of hydro in Tinsley, 'Energy Buzz' offers different ways to get involved – including learning about and supporting renewable energy as well as saving money on your bills.

Sheffield Renewables and South Yorkshire Energy Centre are teaming up to run fun activities for children, a range of volunteering and learning opportunities, and a blitz on cold, draughty houses. It is planned that Energy Buzz and Jordan Dam Hydro will be part-financed by the European Union's European Regional Development Fund. Getting planning permission is a big seal of approval for Jordan Dam. The next big challenge is raising £250,000 towards building costs through a share offer open to individuals, organisations and businesses.

People can invest £250-£20,000 with a special scheme for those on benefits to pay in instalments. Investing in Jordan Dam Hydro is one way to get involved in Energy Buzz and there will be many more.
