As Fuel price rises hit double figures, what can you do to keep warm this winter?

Fuel Poverty and Affordable Warmth in Sheffield

What is Fuel poverty?

A household is in 'fuel poverty' if they need to spend at least 10% of their total household income on fuel to keep their home adequately warm. Sheffield City Council works with other agencies throughout the city to promote awareness of fuel poverty and affordable warmth.

The Council's Sustainable Housing & Affordable Warmth (SHAW) team offers support to people living in privately owned and privately rented housing, particularly in vulnerable households, so that they can lift themselves out of fuel poverty. It achieves this by providing referrals to grants and discount schemes to improve heating, insulation and draught proofing in the home and by providing information and advice on a range of topics from energy efficiency to reducing fuel bills.

Warm Front Grants

If you are a homeowner or you rent from a private landlord, and you are in receipt of a qualifying benefit you could receive a grant of up to £2,700 for insulation and heating improvements from Warm Front.

Warm Front is a government-funded scheme, managed by EAGA Partnerships, which provides grants to make your home warmer, healthier and more efficient.

Free loft and cavity wall insulation for people over 70!

Home-owners and private tenants aged 70 or over are eligible to receive free insulation if their house requires it.

Discount insulation for home-owners and private tenants

Even if you receive no benefits and are under 70 there are schemes which offer to install roof and cavity wall insulation at significantly reduced cost.

How energy efficient is your home?

Loft insulation
Fit loft insulation and save £180 - £220 and around 1.5 tonnes of CO2 pa

Hot water tank
Fit an insulating jacket around the hot water tank and save £20 and 150kg of CO2 pa

Thermostat
Turn down the thermostat by 1°C and save £50 and around 300kg of CO2 pa

Shower
Have a shower instead of a bath and use two thirds less water and energy

Boiler
Upgrade to a condensing boiler and save 1/3 on your heating bills and 1 tonne of CO2 pa

ESR fridge freezer
Upgrade to an ESR fridge freezer and save up to £45 and 180kg CO2 pa

Washing
Wash clothes at 40 degrees rather than 60 and use a third less electricity, and so produce a third less CO2

Energy saving lightbulb
One energy saving lightbulb will save £9 and around 40kg of CO2 pa

Cavity wall insulation
Insulate cavity walls and save £130 - £160 and around 1 tonne of CO2 pa

Draught proofing
Draught proof windows and doors and save £20 and around 140kg of CO2

Appliances
Turn TVs and other appliances off standby when not in use

Fill gaps in floors
Fill in gaps in floors and skirting boards and save £10 - £20 and around 120kg of CO2 pa

26% Loft
26% of heat lost from an uninsulated home is through the roof. Fitting sufficient loft insulation is one of the easiest and most cost effective ways of saving energy and money.

18% Windows
Nearly a fifth of heat lost from an uninsulated home can be through windows. Double glazing windows can save £80 - £100 and 680kg of CO2 pa.

33% Walls
Walls leak more heat than any other part of the home - around a third in an uninsulated home. If your home has cavity walls, insulating them is the best way you can save energy and money.

11% Doors and Floors
Gaps around doors and floors account for around 11% of heat loss in an uninsulated home. Sealing up gaps will stop heat escaping.

ESR
The Energy Saving Recommended (ESR) logo appears on goods that will cost you less to run than older, energy guzzling ones.

Grants and advice available through EST (blue box)
No-cost or low-cost (green box)



Arrangements for Council tenants and housing association tenants are different, and energy efficiency improvements may be carried out as part of major works programmes. Those interested in energy efficiency measures should contact their usual housing office.

Tinsley in Bloom for a Greener Tinsley

Tinsley Tree Project, working in partnership with Tinsley Forum, the City Council's Darnall Area Panel and Sheffield Homes, has been working to improve the local environment as part of Tinsley in Bloom.

The City Council's Darnall Area Panel agreed earlier in the year that they would use some of their funding for the Tinsley in Bloom project. Tinsley Tree Project assisted by Tinsley Forum are to use this funding for new low maintenance shrub beds that would improve upon the unkempt shrub beds on Harrowden Road, Ingfield Avenue and St Lawrence Road.

We have recently commenced work on improving these beds and on the creation of new shrub beds at the pedestrian entranceways to Tinsley Green.

Low maintenance schemes will be implemented in all cases and a range of flowering perennials and shrubs will be planted to bring fragrant colour to the area. Sheffield Homes have offered to undertake future maintenance on the sites and we hope that they will benefit



the area many years into the future. Tinsley Tree Project is currently seeking further funds to enable other improvements to take place and further tree planting schemes will take place over the coming months. Tinsley Community Forestry

Tinsley Community Forestry is about developing the urban forest. It aims to create a healthier, more attractive Tinsley by involving local residents in planning, planting and tending the trees.

Trees are vital to our community because they:

absorb noise and air pollution

filter dust and produce oxygen

attract birds and wildlife

reduce wind speed, provide shelter and

reduce air turbulence

help to reduce heating and cooling costs

tackle flooding by taking up surface water

increase the value of property by between 2% and 18%

Are Health And Wellbeing enhancing

In conjunction with Sheffield Homes and

Tinsley In Bloom we hope to undertake the

following tree planting:

Harrowden Road

3 Japanese Cherries (*Prunus Shimidsu Sakura*) in the garden at the front of the flats. These are an outstanding small cherry with pink buds and large white petals.

St Lawrence Road

2 beautiful *Amelanchier Arborea Robin Hill* trees will be planted outside the flats at the top of St Lawrence Road. A further 3 *Acer Campester Elsrijk*, a cultivar of the field maple, will be planted across the road screening off the electricity sub-station and replacing the dead trees which have been removed.

Ingfield Avenue


